Monochromatic Self Portrait Beginning Art

This assignment will allow you to explore:

- 1. Learning to scale size using a grid
- 2. Learning to measure accurately
- 2. Values in a monochromatic color scheme
- 4. Working with contrast
- 1. I will photograph each of you, and posterize each portrait using Photoshop. From the print of posturized portraits, you will begin by making a 1' inch grid on the print. (heavy instruction on this).
- 2. For the final painting, you will double the size of your grid to 2". Your painting will be 16" x 20". Make sure your grids are accurate!
- 3. Students have to make a value scale (an 8 value scale) with the color they have chosen. I encourage you to use a mixed color, not just straight from the bottle. It's a good reference to work with.
- 4. **Both grids must be drawn accurately**, they have to size up the shapes of the values in your portraits.
- 5. Draw each square in the grid Number the values, 1-4. Sometimes it helps to outline the shapes on the original with a thin sharpie. I also cut croppers to visually isolate each square You are ready to begin to paint your portrait:
- 6. You will begin by painting the white areas and the black areas (black areas will be most interesting with a touch of your color added)
- 7. When those areas are completed, you may pick a single color to create the middle values.
- 8. Work from lightest areas to darkest areas.
- 9. Be certain that you leave no gaps between the areas of paint (no paper peeking through).
- 10. After you have finished the face, paint the background color which contrasts your portrait. It can contrast in one of the following ways: Complementary (opposite each other on Color Wheels), Warm vs. cool, Color vs. grayscale, using color you choose, create values.
